

I. INTRODUCTION

Scholarship on the history of copyright in Latin America is extremely limited, particularly with regard to its development during the nineteenth century. Although in recent years a new generation of scholars has tried to fill that gap, there is still widespread ignorance on the subject, which has reinforced different misconceptions around the evolution of copyright in the region. Some scholars have assumed that Latin American copyright lacks any peculiarity and distinctiveness from the European system. This view has been criticized as "the illusion of a harmonized evolution of the copyright system throughout the countries," that denies local identity, ex-
